

Fiber gets into eye



Overview

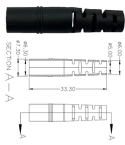
A foreign object in the eye can include a speck of dust or a thin fiber to bigger objects, such as a piece of glass, a metal shaving or a wood splinter. Get immediate medical help if: You can't remove the object with simple flushing or irrigation. The object is embedded in the eye. Fiberglass is a common material, a composite made of microscopic glass shards used primarily in insulation and construction. When these sharp fibers become airborne during handling or cutting, they pose a hazard to the eye's delicate surface.

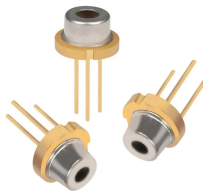

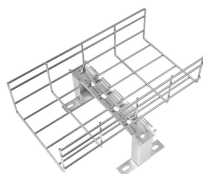
Direct contact with fiberglass or breathing airborne dust containing fiberglass may irritate the skin, eyes, nose, and throat. The symptoms of irritation are often nonspecific, temporary, and ...



If you notice a large number of fibers embedded in and around the eye, seek help from a medical professional instead of attempting to remove the fibers on your own.



Since fiberglass insulation fibers are quite small, they can easily get onto the skin, into the eyes or be inhaled. Fibers lodged in eyeballs, under eyelids and in the eye corners can cause painful ...
