

How to coil fused fiber yarn of varying lengths



Overview

In this video you will learn how to choose the right thread for creating this coil (hint: so it won't break) and we will play with different textures of singles to create fuzzy, smooth, and locked textures of coils for knitting, crochet, and weaving. Common materials used for coiling (cord or yarn) are fibre-flex, sisal, mop yarn, daylily, iris, sweetgrass, pine needles, willow, or straw. For stitching the pieces together or wrapping, a thread-like material such as nettle, palmetto, raffia, or horsehair is usually used. Do not use very soft. If you like, ball it up neatly on one end (like shown) to help prevent tangles. I always recommend core spinning with your slowest ratio, especially for spinners new. Before starting, it is a good idea to read through the directions so you understand the general concepts and principles of the splice. A "Fid" length equals 21 times the diameter of the rope (Ref Fid Chart).

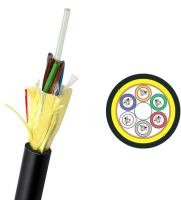
Combing staples with different fiber lengths can be a challenge. In this post I show you how I make the roving as even as possible.



Variations within this type are defined by the method of sewing, as well as by the nature of the coil, which largely determines the type of stitch. The most common ones are spiral coiling, sewed coiling ...



You can make these yarns as thick or thin as you like by varying the amount of fibre you draft around the core and by changing the number of ply steps you use. One of the keys to making a ...



Objective: students will understand and apply the coil technique to make a yarn coil basket. Get a long length of yarn. If you like, ball it up neatly on one end (like shown) to help prevent tangles. Line up 2 ...



Trim excess yarns off strands, using a hot knife, and leave a stub slightly longer than the diameter of a strand. Tuck all the strands 2 more times and thin by 1/3 again, using same procedure as before.



These coiled baskets are a cinch to make. Essentially, all you have to do is to wind double strands of yarn around a core of everyday clothesline. You shape the baskets with your hands as you work to ...
